Pastoral Care Principles launched

GB members get hands-on to renovate van



Members of 35th Birmingham GB group are renovating an old Volkswagen T4 van and repurposing it into a coffee van to accompany events taking place at their church.

The group of 9 are part of a scheme being run by MechaniX – it's the first time the programme has been run in the Midlands and is taking place at the Vehicle Inspection and Training Services (VIATS) training centre in Redditch.

Shirley Giles, 35th Birmingham's Team Leader, says 'We're thankful to be given this opportunity which acknowledges that girls are able, confident learners who can approach this project with courage and enthusiasm, learning skills that will last a lifetime and raise their self-esteem tremendously.'

The GB members and the VIATS training centre were visited by the Lord Mayor of Birmingham, Councillor Mohammed Azim and the Lady Mayoress, Ms Bushra Bi, on Saturday 20 July 2019.

The MechaniX programme, a vocational course, created by Haynes Publishing Group in 2014, is designed to equip participants with the self-reliance and confidence that comes from developing mechanical skills. The participants, aged 15 to 19, will also have an opportunity to learn teamwork and leadership skills which will stand them in good stead and further enable them to grow into responsible, skilled and productive adults.

GB's Endurance Award given to brave cancer fighter



8 year old Isabella Gillies from Ist Andover received a GB Endurance Award in 2019.

Presented at her group's awards evening by Hampshire West District President, Mrs Dianne Richardson, the Endurance Award is a special award that is given to recognise bravery and determination in young people dealing with prolonged or serious illness.

Isabella was diagnosed with a plexiform hystiocystic tumour in her hand in April 2018 and had to undergo three operations. As well as operations, Isabella's treatment included numerous CT and MRI scans and still, Isabella continued to attend her GB group each week and never let the situation get her down. Isabella was given the all clear two days before Christmas 2018.

Following her all clear, Isabella, along with her sister Summer, aged 7, decided to donate over 10 inches of hair to the Little Princess Trust who make wigs for children going through chemotherapy and hair loss.

Build Hope breakfasts

Build Hope breakfasts, designed to showcase the work GB Ministries does in turning up the volume of hope for girls and young women, took place in three locations in 2019 – Southend, Bristol, and Sheffield.



Invites for the breakfasts were sent to local youth workers, church leaders, and politicians.

Carol de-Beger, Deputy District Team Leader of Bristol District hosted an event in October. She said 'The Build Hope breakfast showcased the opportunities GB offers to girls, young women, churches and the community. I felt huge pride to be part of such a robust ministry.'


District Team Leader of 2nd Southend District Sally Claydon, who hosted a breakfast in June, adds 'I wanted to host a Build Hope breakfast because I recognise that in GB we sometimes hide our light under a bushel! We're such a great organisation, doing amazing things with our girls and young women, but sometimes we forget to tell others. Hosting the breakfast was a great way to encourage existing GB chaplains and to remind them how GB and the church can partner together to reach out to families in their area. Everyone went away encouraged and inspired.'

Exciting events

2019 has seen a number of exciting events take place for both GB members and leaders, including:

The Esther Generation Weekend saw 25 young women from across Girls' Brigade England and Wales gather at PGL Liddington in October for one of 2 streams:

- #GBRaisesHope for those completing their Queen's Award
- n:fluence 14-18s for those taking part in young leaders' training.



30 GB leaders attended a **Ruth & Naomi taster retreat weekend** at Cliff College in Derbyshire in July. The event looked at the Book of Ruth and some of the 'holy habits' that can be seen throughout the story, and how we might develop these in our own lives. The GB leaders attending were from across the generations, highlighting that just as Ruth and Naomi were of different generations but supported one another, so can we in our GB family support one another to become more like Jesus.

18 women attended the **Every Woman: Ruth retreat** at Cliff College, Derbyshire, in October. The event was a partnership between GB Ministries and Cliff College and open to all women. All of the women who attended said that the event enabled them to find space to connect with God, and many had powerful stories of God working in their life and speaking to them during the weekend. The weekend will be re-run in June 2020.

Several GB Districts have hosted **Come to the River retreats** for GB leaders throughout the year. These events gave leaders the opportunity to reflect on the Bible story of the women who gathered at the river alongside Lydia in Acts Chapter 16 and what this means for us today. Eight women from GB England & Wales had the fantastic opportunity to travel to Uganda this summer with Fields of Life as part of a **FIZZ mission team** of 13 from GB Europe.

And around 1,000 GB members participated in **UK Parliament Week** in November 2019, where they were introduced to parliament, democracy and politics. For example 3rd Kettering's **n:spire** section learnt about the House of Lords, political parties and what a manifesto is and joined their Boys' Brigade for a four corner debate on various issues. They were treated to a visit from a local ex-MP who now runs a company giving advice about the government to big companies. And Ist Bedworth held a vote on a very important topic – favourite chocolates!

Girls' Brigade Ministries' sustainability plan 2019-2022

Girls' Brigade Ministries (GBM) is the operating name of the charity Girls' Brigade England & Wales (GBEW). Our vision and purpose is for lives and communities to be transformed and enriched as generations seek, serve and follow Jesus Christ.

We do this through our network of local uniformed community groups (GBEW), the video blog koko, The Esther Collective for 18-30s, retreats for women in and out of GB, mission consultancy for churches, and delivering equipping sessions across a number of areas around girls' issues.

Our sustainability plan sets out improvement goals for us to position ourselves as the leading Christian organisation for girls and young women and as a thriving youth organisation. Here's a summary of our 5 growth goals...

- To enable GBM to achieve a financially sustainable platform for the next 10 years
- To share more widely the work of GBM, and the difference it makes upon the lives of girls and young women and their communities AND to secure Royal support and patronage
- To ensure that we have systems in place to enable the collection, analysis and evaluation of robust data to support future growth and funding
- To have in place equipped and resourced staff and volunteers to support delivery growth
 and sustainability AND to identify and implement a new leader registration and group
 management solution AND to increase our engagement with volunteers and the local church
- To ensure that we raise the profile and perception of GBM so that we're seen as a vibrant, proactive and relevant 21st century organisation motivated through our Christian faith, to help girls and young women live 'life to the full' and as a vibrant, proactive and contextually-relevant Christian mission movement for girls and young women that supports the mission and outreach of the local church AND our programme will be contextually-relevant and reflect the diversity and needs of this generation of young people.
