




Unpacking unity

From the age of four, children are generally developing a stronger sense of their own identity and are beginning to discover their place in a wider world. They're beginning to recognise the impact of their actions and the actions of others. This therefore makes it a great time to help them investigate what unity (togetherness) actually means and why it's important to life and the Christian faith.

Unity in diversity

It's important to help your child realise that God has made each of us different – and He has done so for a reason. Share how each one of us is a one-off and how we can each do different things, which is important because together we can then achieve more.

To help your child understand this, share with them the story All God's Critters Got a Place in the Choir by Bill Staines and Kadir Nelson. This is a beautifully illustrated story which shows how everybody has a part to sing (play). It doesn't matter if you sing like a bird; howl like a wolf or croak like a frog - as this is what makes harmony, and the choir, sound so great. To extend this point further you can explain how the animals are singing the same song at the same time – just in different ways. They're together in their purpose – what they're trying to do – and this is what unity is all about.

Doing life together

Ask your child to think about what they're trying to do at their GB group/other club. Use the following sentence to help them:

At GB/my club we're trying to... have fun; make friends; be nice; tidy away quickly; learn about God etc.

Encourage them to think about the different ways they can do these things and still play a part while they're away from their GB group/other club.

Connect

Why not try learning the song linked in the Unity in diversity section? Or if singing isn't your thing, play a music instrument (or make shakers using yoghurt pots and rice sealed in with paper and an elastic band/sticky tape to shake) as the music plays.
