Gabby explains all about her inspiration for fundraising for the Memusi Foundation.

Gabby says, 'i'm very passionate about helping people that need it, so when the idea of doing a meal to raise money for charity came up, I was very excited. I love cooking and baking so I took pride in what I made. I decided to do the meal on my birthday as it shows my dedication to the charity as I'm giving up my special day.

'The charity I raised money for is called the Memusi Foundation which is a charity set up in Kenya that provides help and education for children. Due to generous donations from many people the charity has managed to grow a lot and several schools have been built in Kenya by the charity. The charity is frequently sending out groups of volunteers to go over to the schools to visit the children and help where needed. In July, my mum and I were part of a small group who went out to Kenya to visit. I was so excited to finally go, as we had been planning this trip for years but as COVID hit the trip was cancelled several times.

'On my 14th birthday, I held a 3-course meal to raise more funds for Memusi before we went. I had a lot of help on the night but did all the cooking myself. On the night, we raised £770 to donate and I'm hoping that the money raised can go to help keep young girls in education, as most drop out after primary school to work or get married




- something a young girl shouldn't have to do. Girls deserve to have a good education just as boys do.'

'I stayed up on the sofa and mummy let me watch lots of movies. I also got to play video games. I fell asleep really late and woke up still on the sofa; daddy didn't carry me to my own bed. I got lots of money to help children that live in another house.' Evie

'We played lots of games during the night, such as Jungle Speed, Twister, Top Trumps and Uno. They were all very fun, however, Jungle Speed got very competitive but that made it more fun. Some girls stayed until late and left, but six girls, including me decided to stay

overnight. The other girls managed to stay up till around 6am but I wanted to go to sleep early so I ended up getting in bed at around Iam. During the evening they supplied us with lots of fizzy drinks, sweets and snacks which made it easier to stay up later and at one point during the night we were given pizza. I really enjoyed it and I definitely would like to do it again but the next time I would try and stay up later!' Catherine

Paisley, aged 6, was born with a serious heart condition, called Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome, and Turner Syndrome. She has had 3 major heart operations, with the last in 2022.



The Endurance Award is for GB members who have had prolonged periods of illness, where they may be in and out of hospitals – making Paisley an ideal recipient. She was given the award in July by GB's Assistant Director Catherine Burt.

Pauline, Team Leader at Ist Weymouth, says 'As only half Paisley's heart works properly, she can get out of breath or go blue with too much exercise, but she gives everything 120% commitment and desperately tries to do everything the other GB members can do. Paisley is the most upbeat little girl – always happy – so it's wonderful she's been recognised with a special award.'

Proud parents Mark and Lisa add 'Despite all she's been through, Paisley's always got a smile on her face. She loves school, swimming, trampolining, and absolutely loves Girls' Brigade. She is very head strong with a bubbly personality and just gets on with things.'
